24th November 27th Sunday after Pentecost

Christ the King Sunday

Lectionary Readings:

2 Samuel 23:1-7 Daniel 7:9-10, 13-14 Revelation 1:4b-8 John 18:33-38

Missional Relationality

Here we are at the end of another liturgical year. It is the celebration of Christ who is King. The last few weeks the lectionary has been walking us through the letter to the Hebrews and we learnt that God in the person of Jesus, who was Christ (which is the Greek word for 'messiah') is also our/the Great High Priest. Revelation 1: 6 which is set as a reading connects us being a priesthood and kingdom of God – not the Kingdom of God, but an expression of it. This is at the heart of the Good news which should shape our life and witness as faithful disciples. The writer of Hebrews links Jesus as temple, priest and sacrifice as the reshaping of our understanding of faith and religion from worship and ritual in a set building to us being the temple, priest and sacrifice as we offer our lives as a living sacrifice to God as true worship and witness through service.

Missional resonance is a term many of us will not be familiar with. Missional resonance is a way of being the Church in our wider community context which opens a way of evangelism based on transformational relationships. It is very much linked to what the writer of Hebrews was trying to convey. It helps us gain a radical understanding of how our faith, life and witness might be relevant in our modern society which is increasingly sceptical and resistant to organised religion.

Relevance to our society arises not from us trying to emulate or be a facsimile of aspects of society but evolves from a resonance of our witness to God and our faith in God in ways which meaningfully connect with other people and the way which they experience and understand life. The Good News becomes good news because it is news about how God is at work in them, their life and the world around them for good. What we say and do resonates with people and they begin to resonate with us. It is a transformation of us all through a sharing in mutuality.

Missional relationality comes from a theology of the new covenant and the new temple which writers such as the author of the Epistle to the Hebrews, and of course Jesus, speaks about. This is a complex doctrine in some ways which requires an understanding of how the Tabernacle, and then later the Temple in Jerusalem, functions in terms of God's presence, sacrifice and atonement and worship. However, it can be summarised in a way which might be easily more simply understood and one which helps shape our missional identity.

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Missional Relationality-Continued

In the past worship in the Jewish faith at the time of Jesus was centred in Jerusalem and the Temple. In the Temple was the Holy of Holies, the section which was divided off – literally set apart – by a large curtain, that was also known as the veil. In this space was the symbolic, and for some literal, place of the presence of God. It was the connection point between Heaven and Earth. It was the intersection of the holy being of God and our time and space as part of God's creation.

The Holy of Holies was the space that only the High Priest could enter only once a year to offer sacrifices on behalf of the people to set God's people in right relationship with God, despite all their falling short / sinning for the year leading up to that time. However, when Jesus died on the Cross the curtain, which was over one storey tall, which separated people from the presence of God, was torn in two from top to bottom. This was part of the symbolic and literal breakdown of the Temple as part of the new covenant God was making through God as the person of the Christ.

There is a lot around atonement theory and theology which could be explored and is worth exploring, but the relevance to our missional identity comes from an understanding of atonement being at-one-ment. That is through God in the person of Jesus, who was the Christ and Immanuel – which means 'God with us' [Matthew 1:23], we can be at one with God. Helping us understand this is Jesus claiming to be

the ultimate expression of the temple with his body being the symbol for it.

The writer of Hebrews, as this understanding of a new covenant and a new understanding of how to relate to God speaks that Jesus is the temple, the high priest, the veil which is torn open and the sacrifice which brings atonement.

Why this became important for our understanding of our mission is that we who are the Church are also known as the Body of Christ. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 3: 16-17, "Don't you know that you yourselves are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in your midst" If ...for God's temple is sacred, and you together are that temple." As Christ is the temple and we are the temple under the new covenant.

Jesus is the Great High priest who offers the sacrifice for the people to make them right in relationship with God [Hebrews 4: 14-16], and does not need to do this repeatedly because he offered himself as sacrifice. We are then claimed as priests as part of the priesthood of all believers. The writer of 1 Peter 2: 9-10 states, "But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light. Once you were not a people, but now you are the people of God; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy." As Christ is the Great High Priest we are the priests of God as the Body of Christ under the new covenant.

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Missional Relationality-Continued

Jesus is the sacrifice which brings atonement / at-one-ment. As part of God's atonement / at-one-ment for us is Jesus being killed on the cross and God submitting to this death as an expression of God's love and part of the working of God's redemption of us and all humanity. This helps shape our missional understanding because as the writer of 1 John 3 makes clear, "This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters." [1 John 3: 16] Christ is the sacrifice which brings at-one-ment with God and we are called to be imitators of Christ as Paul writes in Ephesians 5: 1-2, "Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children; and walk in love, just as Christ also loved you and gave Himself up for us, an offering and a sacrifice to God as a fragrant aroma."

To bring this all together as part of an understanding of missional relationality, under the new covenant which God established as Christ, we do not worship God in a temple for God's presence is not located or symbolised in a special building. God's presence is located not just symbolically, but spiritually in us. We don't need priest to mediate to God on our behalf, for God is in us as we are the priesthood of all believers of God as Christ. Thus, when we come into relationship with others who may not yet know or comprehend God being at work in them or their lives, we become a way for them to open them to the presence of God. As we are in relationship with them and resonate with the presence of God then, hopefully, they begin to comprehend the resonance of God being in them as Spirit.

In all this our relationships become our worship, for we not only mediate or resonate with the presence of God for others, but we embody the love of God for them as we seek to love them as ourselves, just as Jesus identified as being the most important aspect of faith and discipleship [Matthew 22:39; Mark 12:31; Luke 10:27-28] Those who live in love, live in God and God lives in them [1 John 4:16] Here our living becomes our witness. Our loving others not only is a joining in God's mission, but it also should resonate with people who do not yet comprehend God at work in them and their lives because most people know what love is and live it as part of their lives. However, our witness becomes also the inviting others to seek to understand how this is good news about what and who we understand God to be and how God is at work in all of us, as well as how this is are the core of what God in the person of Jesus referred to as the Kingdom of God or the Kingdom of Heaven.

This is a lot to think about, but very important as we move into the preparation for celebrating anew the incarnation of God in the person of Jesus.
